Background Information

Launched nationally by the American Dental Association Foundation (ADA Foundation) in 2024, Give Veterans A Smile® (GVAS), was created to help call national attention to the unmet oral health needs of Veterans by:

- ★ Encouraging dentists to provide pro bono oral health care services to underserved Veterans during the month of November via a one or multi-day screening process which would include examination, radiographs, prophylaxis, and development of a treatment plan, plus addressing any emergent care; assist them in finding a dental home or refer them to a dental facility (dental practice, residency, school, FQHC) or an organization that can assist in providing a dental home, and
- ★ Collecting data and sharing the dollar value of charitable oral health care provided nationally to help guide advocacy efforts aimed at increasing funding and access to care for underserved Veterans.

The ADA Foundation provides tools and resources for local GVAS program volunteers so they can focus on what they do best: providing much-needed oral health care to Veterans in underserved communities.

We invite your dental school to join us and *Be Part of the GVAS Movement* to help increase access to care to underserved Veterans in your community.

Purpose of the Guide

This document provides useful information and resources to assist dental school administrators, staff, and students on how they may participate in the ADA Foundation Give Veterans A Smile program.

GVAS Event Types

Education Only

The Education Only event includes oral health education, with NO other oral health services **provided** during the event. Education Only events generally take place in a community setting. Consider offering presentations to veteran groups (VFW, DAV, etc.) that discuss the importance of regular dental visits, the relationship between oral health and overall health, and oral issues commonly faced by veterans. These events should include referral resources for those veterans in need of oral health care services.


Screening

Screening events can take place in a variety of locations such as veterans' organizations, community health fairs, county fairs, or anywhere veterans may congregate. A visual oral screening can include a soft tissue exam, hard tissue visual exam, denture evaluation, and an oral cancer screening. These events should also include referral resources for those veterans in need of oral health care services.

Preventive/Restorative

The Preventive/Restorative event delivers oral health education, screening exam, radiographs, prophylaxis, fluoride treatment, fillings, restorations, extractions, root canals, impressions, etc. This type of event takes place in a clinical setting, such as a dental school, dental office or clinic.

Planning Structure



- * **Program Coordinators** Select a small group of motivated, outgoing students and/or faculty to take the lead on planning your GVAS event.
- ★ **Dental Students** Suggestions are provided below for how all levels of students may participate in your school event. Note that roles should be decided internally, and depend on the level of training achieved.
 - **D1** Oral health education / Front help
 - **D2** Preventive care / Cleaning / X-ray / Assisting
 - **D3** Sterilization / Dispensing / Clinical work/ Assisting
 - D4 Clinic work
 - Residents More complex clinical work/ Extractions / Root canals
 - Faculty and Administration Provide approvals / Supervise flow of clinic / Triage / Liability and Risk Management
- * Interprofessional Participation This applies only if school offers other interprofessional disciplines.
 - **Nutrition Students** Talk to veterans about the importance of eating healthy foods.
 - Medical Students Talk to veterans about the mouth body connection, overall health.
 - Audiology Students Conduct hearing screenings, need for hearing aids, etc.
- * **Recruitment** Veteran Organizations (e.g., VFW) / Churches / Community centers
- ★ Media/Promotion Work with your school's media team to develop a promotion plan Press release / Promotional video / TV / Print / Flyers / Social media
- * Sponsorship Product and supply donations / Food donations for veterans and volunteers
- * ADAF GVAS Participation form / Website resources

Suggested Timeline

Give Veterans A Smile events can take place during any month of the year. The timeline below provides a sample timeline for those who choose to hold an event in November when Veterans Day in honored and the national annual kickoff of GVAS will be celebrated.

Month	Objective
June/July	★ Complete participation form online at adafoundation.org/give-veterans-a-smile/register-to-volunteer.
August	 Plan and develop your GVAS event. Obtain internal approvals. Assemble an interprofessional student team. Determine locations for recruitment (veteran organizations, churches, etc.). Identify roles for students, faculty, and staff.
September	Begin the process of recruiting veterans for your event.Develop funding proposals.
October	 Submit requests for funding/sponsorship. Confirm volunteers. Expand the recruitment process if needed.
November	 Confirm patient roster. Prepare event space and implement a GVAS program. Share your event data at GVAS@ada.org.
